




Saint John Maximovitch was born in the Kharkov region in 1896, and reposed in San Francisco in 1966.

In 1921, during the Russian Civil War, his family fled to Belgrade, joining the ranks of Russian exiles in Serbia, where he later became a monk and was ordained priest. In 1934 he was made Bishop of Shanghai, where he served his Chinese and Russian flock until the Communists came to power. Thereafter he ministered in Europe, serving as Bishop first in Paris then in Brussels, until he became Archbishop of San Francisco in 1962.

Throughout his life he was revered as a strict ascetic, a devoted man of prayer, and a truly wondrous unmercenary healer of all manner of afflictions and woes. He served the Divine Liturgy daily, slept little more than an hour a day, and kept a strict fast until the evening.

Saint John was an unwearying and watchful shepherd of his sheep in China, the Philippines, Europe, and America. Saint John oversaw the evacuation of and care for hundreds of Chinese children, orphaned during the war. He established a home for his orphans in San Francisco, and it was these faithful who accompanied his coffin at his funeral in 1966.

Through his missionary labours he also brought countless souls into the Church. Since his repose, he has been especially glorified by God through signs and miracles, and his body has remained incorrupt in the New Cathedral in San Francisco.

**Our Speaker:**

**Father Peter Heers**



Father Peter Heers was born in Texas and grew up near San Francisco. The son of an Anglican priest, in 1992 his parents and much of his father's parish converted to the Orthodox Church. In 1998 he began the Theological School of the University of Thessaloniki. He lived in Thessaloniki for two decades with his beloved wife and five children.

In addition to being the founder and current head of Uncut Mountain Press, Father Peter was also the founder and first editor of "Divine Ascent, A Journal of Orthodox Faith." Father Peter is the author of *The Missionary Origins of Modern Ecumenism*, as well as *The Ecclesiological Renovation of the Second Vatican Council*. He is also the translator of books including the *Life of Elder Paisios*, *The Truth of our Faith by Elder Cleopa* and *Apostle to Zaire*, as well as the best-selling children's book *From I-ville to You-ville*.

He holds a doctorate in Dogmatic Theology from the University of Thessalonica, and served as rector of the parish of the Holy Prophet Elias in Petrokerasa, Greece. Since 2016, he has served as a professor at Holy Trinity Seminary in Jordanville, NY.
